

ProGuitar - Do You Know Your Triads?

It's a great thing to learn the triads on your instrument. It will help you no matter what style of music that you play. In this example, we're showing you the major triads all over the fretboard on the different sets of strings. We chose the key of E major, but once you've learned those - you should start moving around in other keys. It's fairly easy to learn and the shapes are all the same in every key! If you're not familiar with the theory terms yet, here's what those things mean: "1st inversion" means playing the triad but with the 3rd of the chord as the lowest note. "2nd inversion" means playing the triad but with the 5th as the lowest notes. The triads has the exact same notes but in different order. Have fun!
